

Leading Parent Partnership Award

We are delighted to announce that Valence School has once again been awarded the Leading Parent Partnership Award (LPPA). What is LPPA?

The LPPA is a nationally recognised accreditation supporting schools to plan and deliver effective parental engagement. The assessment is made by an external assessor and for Valence, this took place last week after a team of staff led by Zena Belton provided evidence of our commitment to work proactively with parents.

The assessor spent a day with us reviewing documentation, touring the school, and meeting with staff and parent representatives before commenting that at Valence "There is a real sense of **working together** as a team in a **personalised** way to solve the challenges and barriers faced by each child and parents feel an active part of this both valued as experts in their child and supported as valued members of the school community."

During the visit the assessor noted that some of the school's strengths are:

- ⇒ Our openness and relationships with parents in particular within overarching vision "Enabling Independence" to which the whole staff team buy in.
- ⇒ Transition into the school is carefully managed to ensure parents feel supported and know what to expect. Parents (and pupils) are also actively guided and supported through the process of transition beyond the school in line with the overarching aim of "Enabling Independence".
- ⇒ Support and guidance for parents comes from a wide range of school staff and can be easily accessed.

What became clear in his visit was the impact this makes:

- ⇒ That the regular programme of coffee mornings with a training element provide parents with support and sense of community this brings.
- ⇒ That we have embraced the opportunities of remote meetings to promote parental engagement in their child's life and provide better engagement from other professionals
- ⇒ That we have set up a community shop to raise the profile of the school in the wider community and provide a hub for parents.
- ⇒ That the school provided a high level of support to families during the COVID pandemic, working together in the most challenging circumstances.

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International Wheelchair Day 1st March

This is a day of events and activities which take place around the world when wheelchair users celebrate the positive impact a wheelchair has on their lives. We



certainly did that at Valence last Friday the students had a crammed packed day celebrating all things about wheelchairs. There was a carousel of workshops covering a variety of topics

Stretch - how to complete stretches whilst in your chair, lead by Aurelie and the therapy assistants

Drive—wheelchair driving practice run by therapy team in the sports hall

Maintain – was a 15min drop in session where the class talked about looking after their wheelchair

WOW my wheelchair — this was an opportunity to decorate one wheel chair in the class No wheelchairs were to be harmed during this activity!!!

On National Wheelchair day our morning started in the sports hall where we learnt about how to drive safely in powerchairs in public. This covered things such as looking both ways when crossing a road and being aware of your surroundings when driving in public.

After our morning session I went to the main hall to watch H1, S1 and S2 learn all about stretches in their chairs. They learnt that pain can come from sitting in their chairs for a long amount of time. They completed a range of exercises from leaning forward to twisting with their arms crossed.

Then with Mary Green we learnt about the history of wheelchairs. We looked at early designs and discussed the differences between what they were like then and now, as well as what was similar. Overall, the day was really good and I found it really interesting

We challenged the students to think about People on the TV with a disability for example





The TARDIS has a ramp!

For the older students they were encouraged to look at The A-Z of Going to University, written for young wheelchair users by young wheelchair users.



Gail has been working with Simmonds 2 this half term, teaching them more skills in their Outdoor Learning sessions. We have thoroughly enjoyed planting cherry tomatoes, lettuces, courgettes, and a selection of flowering plants. We are loving seeing these seedlings growing on the windowsills in our classroom, as well as our outings to the poly tunnel. This has linked into our discussions in PSHE about healthy lifestyle choices. The students have also had the opportunity to work on their gross and fine motor skills when handling the soil and seeds, as well as the sprayer to water the plants.

As a class, their confidence and communication skills are really blossoming. The classroom move and the timetable restructure has led to the students exploring new friendships and having the opportunities to do some lovely group work together, where they have lots of opportunities to chat and communicate.
